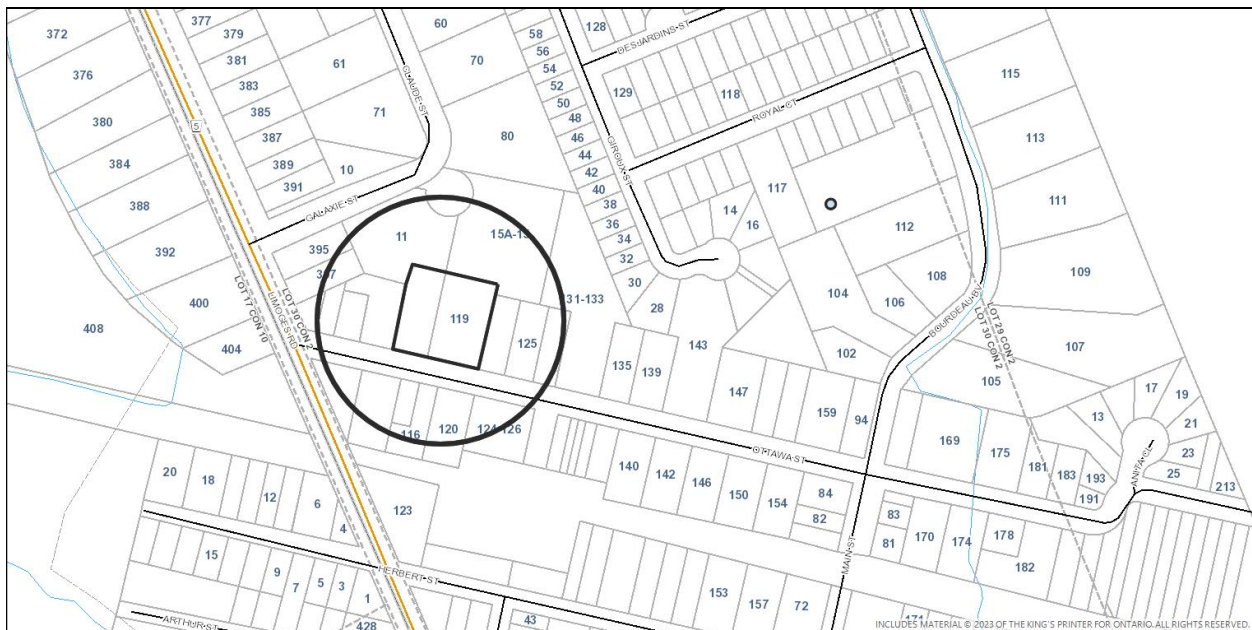
PREAMBLE:

On August 14, 2023, a public meeting was held to present an application to amend zoning by-law ZBL-7-2023. This request was to modify the zoning category of lots bearing civic numbers 113-119 Ottawa Street to allow two apartment blocks of 21 units each. The SAT presented a report and the public and agencies had the opportunity to submit comments. This report will review the comments submitted and generally answer questions. This review can be found under "COMMENTS".

Below is the report presented at the public meeting.

INTRODUCTION:

Les Habitations Leclair and Mr. Stephane Leclair have submitted an application to amend Zoning By-law 2-2006, file ZBL-7-2023, regarding the properties located at 113 & 119 Ottawa Street, in order to build two 21-unit apartment blocks, reduce the minimum area per unit from 400 square metres to 132 square metres, increase the maximum height from 10.6 metres to 12 metres and allow a maximum overlap area of 40% instead of 15%.



PROVINCIAL POLICY STATEMENT

Under section 1.1.1, the PPD cites that to maintain healthy and safe communities, we must:

a) encourage efficient forms of development and land use that support the long-term financial vitality of the province and municipalities;

b) permit an appropriate range and diversity of uses for residential (e.g., second dwellings, affordable housing, housing for the elderly), employment (including industrial and commercial), institutional (e.g., places of worship, cemeteries, long-term care homes), recreational, open space, outdoor and other purposes to meet long-term needs;

e) encourage cost-effective forms and standards of development that minimize land use and servicing costs;

Under section 1.1.3, the PPD encourages us to develop a mix of residential uses in urban centers. The PLR encourages municipalities to redevelop settlement areas by densifying existing land within

villages. This densification should maximize existing infrastructures.

Under section 1.4.3, the PLR asks us to provide an appropriate diversity and range of housing types and densities to meet the needs of current and future residents of the regional market area by:

- a) establishing and implementing minimum targets for the provision of affordable housing to low- and moderate-income households....
- b) enabling and facilitating:
 - a. all forms of housing necessary to meet the social, health and welfare needs, including special needs, of current and future residents;
 - b. all forms of residential densification, including second dwellings, and redevelopment in accordance with policy 1.1.3.3;
- c) directing new housing development to locations where appropriate levels of infrastructure and public service facilities are or will be available to meet current and future needs;
- d) by encouraging densities of new housing that make efficient use of land, resources, infrastructure and utility facilities, and that support the use of active transportation and public transit in areas where they are available or to be located;
- e) by establishing development standards for residential densification, redevelopment and new residential development that minimize housing costs and facilitate compact development, while maintaining appropriate levels of public health and safety.

Under section 1.6.6.1, the PPD encourages us to orient and respond to planned growth or development in a way that promotes the efficient use and optimization of existing municipal sewer and water services.

Also, in section 1.6.6.2, the PPD states that municipal sewer and water services are the preferred method of servicing settlement areas. Wherever possible, densification and redevelopment based on existing municipal sewer and water services should be encouraged in settlement areas. Bylaw amendment request meets MPD.

OFFICIAL PLAN:

The parcel of property is listed under the "Urban Policy Area" allocation in Appendix A to the Official Plan of the United Counties of Prescott and Russell.

Policies 2.2.6 & 2.2.7 on residential development encourage a mix of residential and commercial uses within urban areas and to densify even the core areas of our urban zones.

The SAT can confirm that the zoning by-law amendment meets the intentions of the official plan.

ZONING BY-LAW:

The properties in question are zoned 'medium-density residential' (R2).

The purpose of the amendment request is to change the zoning category of the parcel to "High Density Residential - Exception (R3-X)".

The amendment, "Residential High Density - Exception (R3-X6)", proposes to reduce the minimum area per unit from 400 square metres to 132 square metres, increase the maximum height from 10.6 metres to 12 metres and allow a maximum overlap area of 40% instead of 15%.

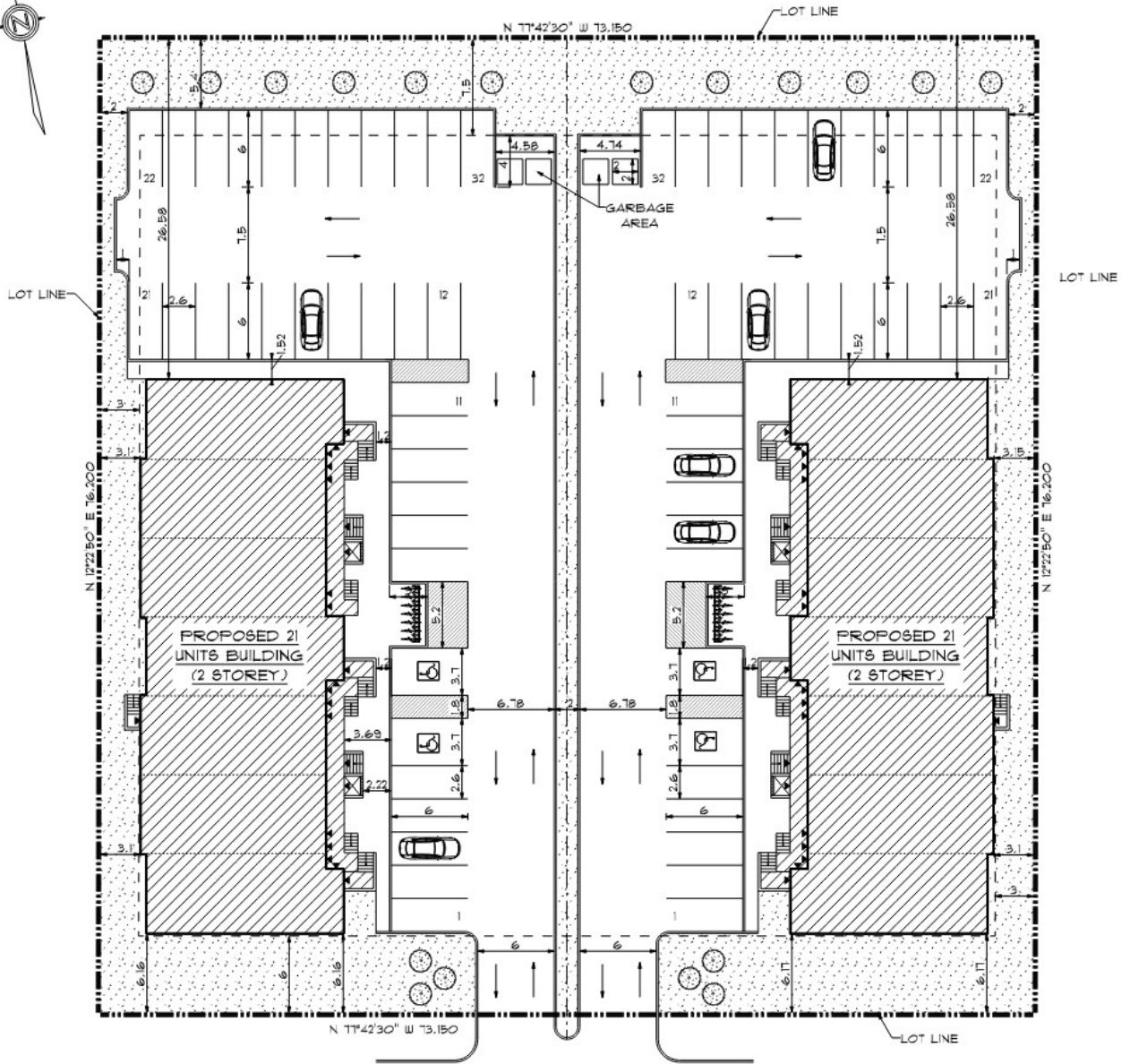

BEING A BY-LAW TO AMEND THE COMPREHENSIVE ZONING BY-LAW 2-2006, AS AMENDED;

WHEREAS By-Law 2-2006, the Comprehensive Zoning By-Law, regulates the use and erection of buildings and structures in The Nation Municipality;

WHEREAS an application has been received to change the zoning of a certain parcel of land in The Nation Municipality;

AND WHEREAS the Council of the Corporation of The Nation Municipality considers it appropriate to amend the Zoning By-Law 2-2006, as described;

NOW THEREFORE, the Council of the Corporation of The Nation Municipality enacts as follows:

Section 1: The property located on part of Lot 30, Concession 2 in the former Township of Cambridge, now in The Nation Municipality, County of Russell, shown on Schedule "A", attached to and forming part of this By-Law, shall be the property affected by this By-Law.

Section 2: Schedule "A" of Zoning By-Law 2-2006 is hereby amended by changing from "Medium Density Residential (R2)" to "High Density Residential - Exception (R3-X35)" the symbol of the land indicated on the attached Schedule "A" hereto made fully part of this by-law.

Section 3: Subsection 5.21.4 of Zoning By-Law 2-2006 entitled "Exception Zones", is hereby amended by adding the following new paragraphs:

5.5.4.35 R3-X35, 113-119 Ottawa Street

Notwithstanding Section 5.5 "High Density Residential Zone" of Zoning By-Law 2-2006, hereof to the contrary, on the land zoned R3-X35, the following provisions shall apply;

-Minimum Lot Area per unit:	132 m ² / per dwelling unit
-Maximum lot coverage:	40%
-Maximum height:	12 metres

Section 4: All other provisions of By-Law 2-2006 shall continue to apply.

Section 5: Subject to the giving of notice of passing of this By-Law, in accordance with Section 34(18) of the Planning Act, R.S.O. 1990 as amended, this By-Law shall come into force on the date of passing by the Council of the Corporation of The Nation Municipality where no notice of appeal or objection is received, pursuant to Section 34(21) of the Planning Act, R.S.O. 1990 as amended.

COMMENTS ON AUGUST 14, 2023:

Some concerns were raised at the meeting.

Surface water control.

It is essential that the development does not send water onto neighboring properties and that snow removal be located within the lot to prevent snow from melting and creating a greater amount of surface water than existing conditions.

Privatization fence

We could include in the bylaw a 6-foot opaque fence made of aesthetically pleasing materials around the project.

Building setbacks

Following certain modifications and discussions with the developer, we came up with two options. One with the buildings toward the property lines and the other locating the buildings in the middle of the lot. The two location plans are shown in Appendix 3A and 3B of this report.

Depending on the location of the buildings, this may alleviate concerns about the enjoyment of neighbouring properties' backyards.

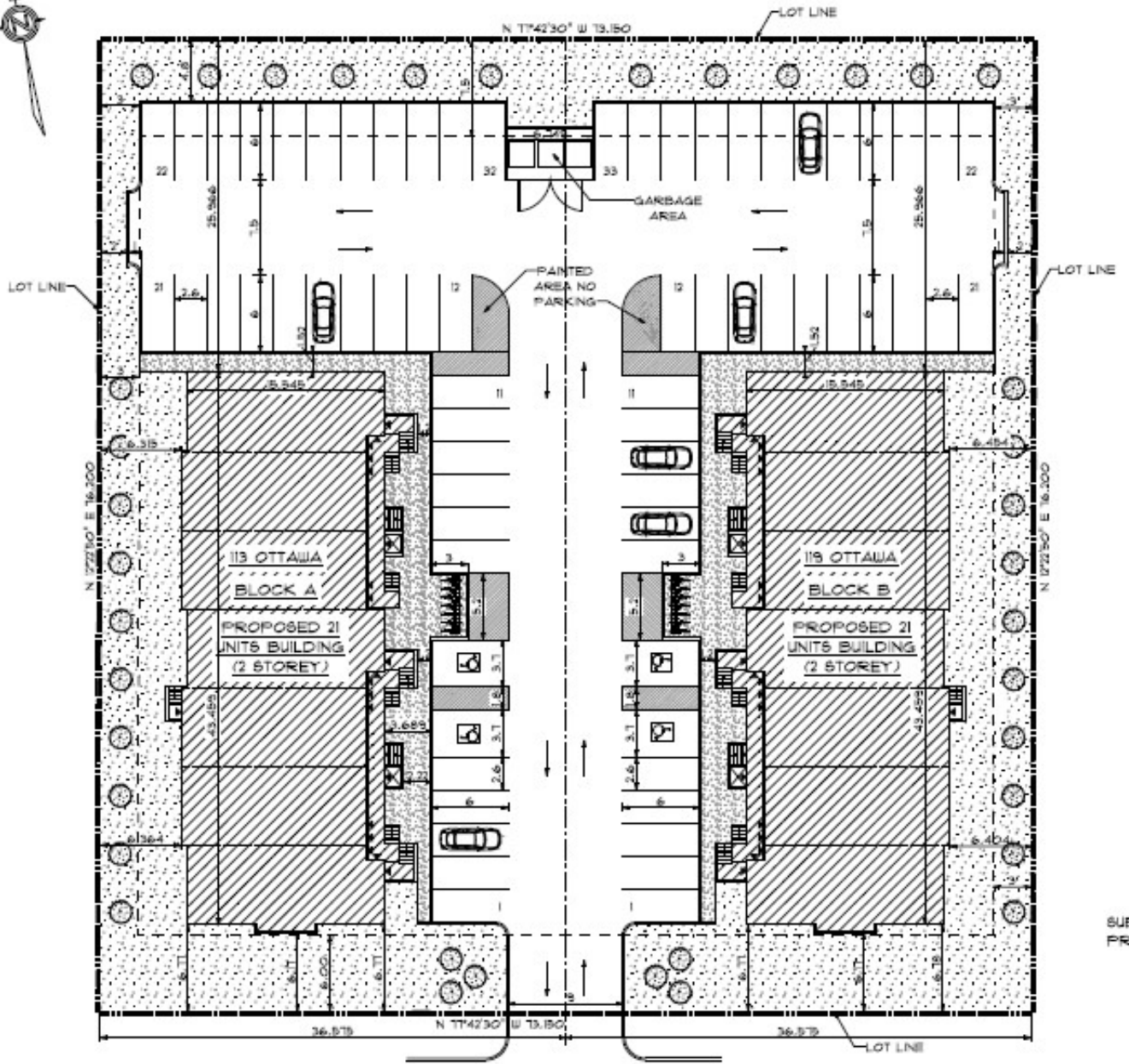
Street parking

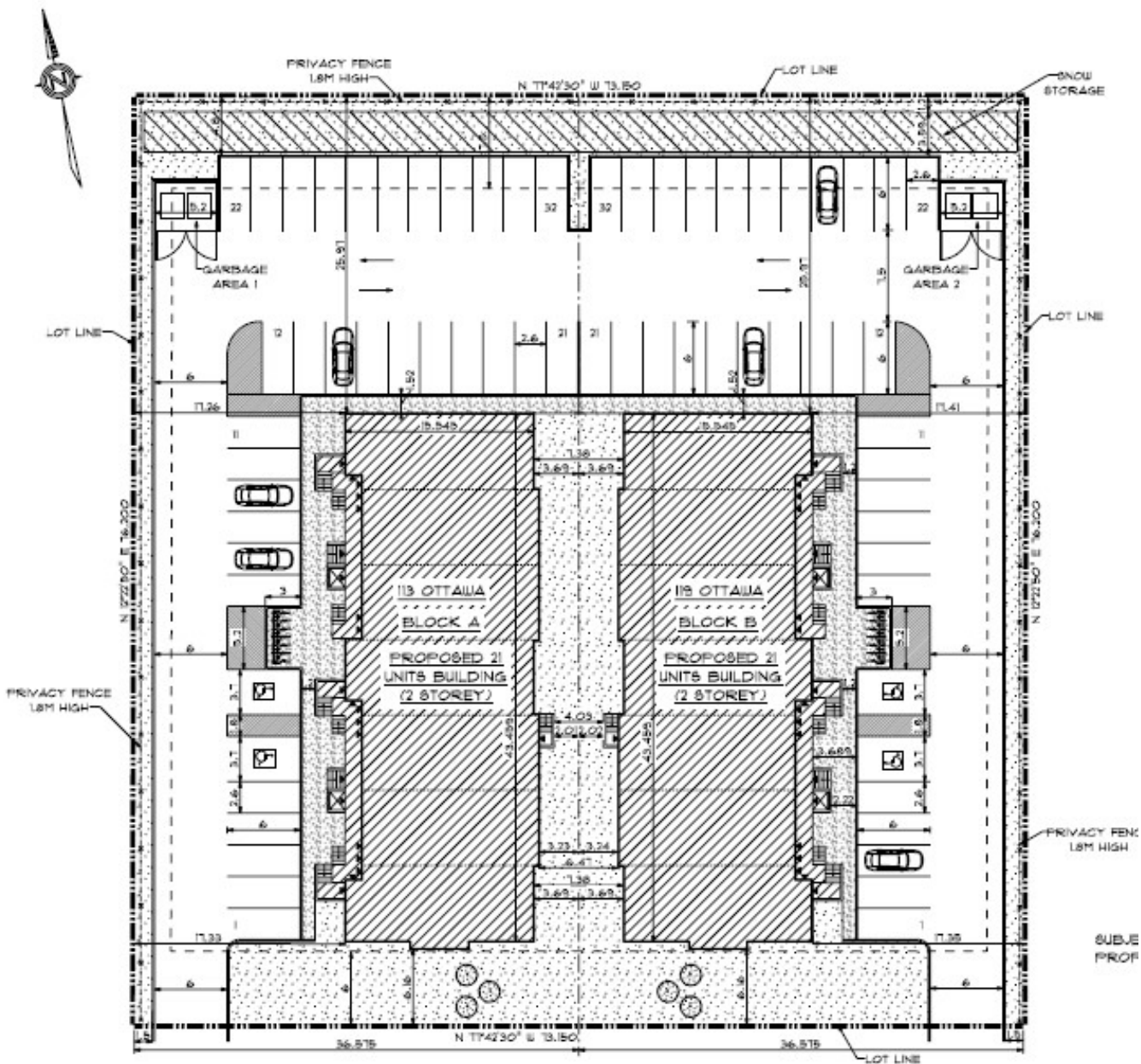

Please find enclosed a brief description of work performed for the period between from March 1st to March 31st, 2024.

General Drainage concerns

- 1) We continue to assist the engineer appointed to provide a section 78(5) report for the partial realignment of the Donat Laflèche main drain when information is needed. I contacted the SNCA to discuss certain requests they made to provide a quicker response and see if some engineering costs are necessary. The project is on 100 meters only, and some requested items seemed to be mostly generic information that would not be considered for a smaller project where the drain profile will not be altered at all. This project should be constructed in July of 2024. The United-Counties are planning to replace the road culvert on this drain later this spring. This will help release the upper end of the system being presently restricted by the partially collapsed culvert. We are planning to perform the ditch bottom clean out of the upper section later this fall after crops are removed from the fields as requested by the landowner.
- 2) We inspected the Horse Creek municipal drain where a landowner requested maintenance before the March 15th deadline, but the water level was too high to do an effective maintenance. We will discuss this request later this fall to plan a summer or fall maintenance schedule.
- 3) The maintenance of the Ernest Durivage municipal drain was completed in early March when the road culvert and erosion rock protection was set along the outlet of the culvert.

- 4) We assisted the treasurer to complete the maintenance grant application for work completed in 2023. The application as to be filed at Transfer Payment Ontario before the April 31st deadline.
- 5) We attended the SNCA Flood Forecasting and Warning Information Seminar. We heard representatives from each governing major water bodies giving us an update of the actual conditions, and predictions for this coming spring freshet being already at lower water levels than normally seen at this time of year. This is a good opportunity to exchange with others to discuss floodplains, water management and public warning to better predict and notify owners of safety issues along major watercourses.
- 6) We assisted the engineer appointed and clerk to provide a new report for the Ranger municipal preparing the meeting-to-consider the report by the municipal council where landowners also have an opportunity to voice their concerns or gather information if they choose to. The meeting-to-consider will be held on April 2th, 2024.
- 7) I received a request to meet landowners along the Chretien road and concession 11 area to discuss drainage procedures to consider to get a sufficient outlet for their properties. We had two onsite meetings with landowners to give them information about mutual agreement drains, and municipal drains. I had a discussion with the Public Works Director before the second meeting to know if the unopen road allowance towards the South Nation River was municipal property, and he confirmed it was not, as there was no structured road between the eleventh concession and the River. I explained the procedures every drain would require and an approximate timeline. Told them to look at the petition form requesting conditions needed and they should expect to have to pay the costs of the procedures if they petition for a new drainage work.
- 8) We tended the D.S.A.O. booth at the Ottawa Valley Farm Show on the first day. This gives an opportunity for Drainage Superintendent to have informational discussions with landowners in regards to best management practices, timing windows to perform work, and watercourse jurisdictions, and who should be responsible in different watercourses and classification could affect landowners. We always meet landowners from our municipality and appreciate the discussions that we might not have the opportunity to meet if they would not reach out for a specific reason. This format is less formal and people are glad to get information that could help to make informed decisions moving toward future plans.
- 9) We began planning our 2024 work list, and prepared preliminary stages to meet landowners to discuss maintenance work along municipal drains. We are also filing completed 2023 maintenance work including plans and assessments schedules of the affected areas. We also worked on the digital filing of documents.

- 10) We attended the D.S.A.O. Chapter 6, spring meeting where we gather updates to different law changes, discussions about different issues that members encounter, and solutions shared to help other members. We received the new "Conservation Authority Exceptions for the Drainage Community Further to the Release of Ontario Regulation 41/21: Prohibited Activities, Exemptions and Permits under the Conservation Authorities Act". This requires the municipality to send a maintenance notification to the CA's as we were already doing. The new procedure change does not require for the CA's signature being a notification of maintenance where the CA's cannot charge a permit fee for this review unless the work is not a regular maintenance procedure as listed in the procedures. The D.S.A.O. Chapter 6 has been very active in our community looking at ways to assist municipal staff in the last years. A presentation held in the afternoon of this meeting where clerks and municipal staff having to work with municipal drain issues invited to attend virtually. The members had an opportunity to let others know what projects they were working on, and exchange ideas during a round table discussion. The presentation was to give information about procedures of the Ontario Drainage Act, from initial appointment of the engineer, the timelines of each procedure from preliminary reports, to court-of revision, and tribunal planning. Municipal drain abandonment was also part of the presentation. The area was well represented by municipal staff during this meeting. I was re-elected to the treasurer's position of our Chapter being the third running year.
- 11) We began to inspect work completed in 2023 to see if any adjustments need to be done for slopes stability as work was completed during late fall when the soil was half frozen or wet in some areas.

Hoping the above is to your satisfaction, I remain.

Context

This purpose of this report is to recommend a consultant who can assist in the preparation of our Asset Management Plan (“AMP”). In selecting the consultant, a proven track record in asset management, relevant industry experience, and the ability to deliver high quality results within our budget and timeline were evaluated to recommend the most suitable partner for our needs.

Report

The Nation consulted a few municipalities to find out what consultants were being used for the preparation of their asset management plan. Several municipalities were preparing it in house and others used WSP Global Inc. (WSP) or PSD Citywide Inc. (PSD). The Nation therefore approached WSP and PSD to get a quote as well as a potential timeline for the preparation of our Asset Management Plan.

After careful analysis of their proposals as well as the service offering for each consultant, it was concluded that PSD would best meet our needs, our budget, and our timeline.

- PSD has been involved in asset management for decades. They manage over \$350+ billion in assets, and their team includes engineers, technicians, and former municipal executives.
- Our initial AMP was prepared by PSD and the 2022 AMP was prepared in-house on the same template. This would allow continuity in information presentation and preparation.
- We are currently using PSD for the update, management, and storage of our asset management information. This will allow easier access and understanding of the data for the consultant.
- The 2025 AMP requires numerous updates to lifecycles and levels of service. In the coming year, PSD will be solicited to provide valuable training which should be helpful in preparing and updating data that will be used in the preparation of the 2025 AMP.

Relevance to priorities

O. Reg 588/2017 Asset Management Plan (AMP) requirements are as follows:

July 1, 2022 – Phase I, Core Assets - COMPLETED

July 1, 2024 – Phase II

- All assets included in AMP, core and non-core, as well as:
 - Levels of service

July 1, 2025 – Phase III

- Update all categories in AMP with:
 - Proposed levels of service and explanations for them

 - Lifecycle management and financial strategies

Communication Plan

The final asset management plan will be available on our municipal website as per provincial requirement.

Purchase Policy

As per section 6.4 of F-2016-03 Purchasing Policy, quotes were obtained from available suppliers (in this case two). As well, since the quote exceeds the budget by more than 10%, this report was prepared for Council approval before proceeding.

Financial Considerations

The total proposed cost for the preparation of the 2024 and 2025 asset management plans is \$64,000 - \$32,000 per year.

The quoted price for the preparation of the 2025 AMP is \$32,000. The difference of \$14,000 would be included in the 2025 budget.

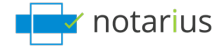

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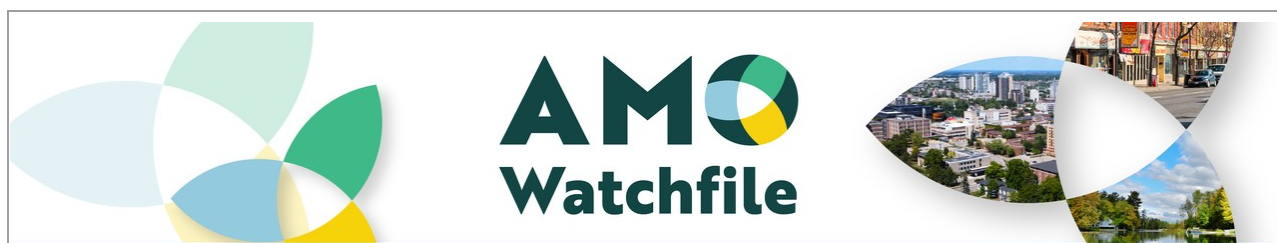

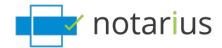

Please be advised the Municipal Council of the Town of Fort Erie at its meeting of March 18, 2024 received and supported correspondence from the Architectural Conservancy Ontario dated February 8, 2024 requesting the Provincial Government to amend Subsection 27(16) of the Ontario Heritage Act by extending the deadline for five years, from January 1, 2025 to January 1, 2030, and passed the following resolution:

Whereas subsection 27(16) of the Ontario Heritage Act stipulates that any non-designated heritage property listed on the municipal register of properties as of December 31, 2022 shall be removed from the municipal register on or before January 1, 2025, if the council of the municipality does not give a notice of intention to designate the property under subsection 29(1) of the Ontario Heritage Act on or before January 1, 2025; and

Whereas since January 1, 2023, municipal staff and members of the municipal heritage committee in this municipality have been diligently working to: review the municipal heritage register; research the heritage value and interest of listed (non-designated) properties; review and research the heritage value and interest of non-designated properties; contact owners of such properties; determine which properties should potentially be designated in accordance with the provisions of Section 29 of the Ontario Heritage Act; and take all required steps to designate such properties; and

Whereas the above-noted work involving 34 listed properties in this municipality is extremely time-consuming and cannot be completed by December 31, 2024 with the limited municipal resources available;



Re: Looming expiry date for protection of heritage properties listed under the *Ontario Heritage Act*

We are writing to express our concerns with a key amendment to the *Ontario Heritage Act*; which your government passed in 2022. Under it, any heritage property listed on a municipal register as of December 31, 2022 shall be removed from the register on January 1, 2025, unless that council has given notice of its intention to designate the property under the Act. Properties that lose listing status cannot be re-listed for another five years.

This change affects some 36,000 listed heritage properties, according to the Ministry of Citizenship and Multiculturalism, in over 100 municipalities across the province. These properties have only limited, short-term (60 day) protection. As ACO warned in December 2022, forcing municipalities to designate all listed properties within two years or drop them from the register was draconian and totally unrealistic. With the expiry date now less than one year away, municipalities, large and small, are scrambling to review their registers and prioritize properties for designation or other protection. The staff/financial cost in research alone is enormous.

Automatically removing listed properties from the registry in less than eleven months will encourage demolition of existing and affordable housing alternatives at a time when we need them the most.

ACO is asking that Subsection 27(16) of the *Ontario Heritage Act* be amended in the spring session of the Legislature, to extend the deadline in the Act for five years, from January 1, 2025 to January 1, 2030. This early certainty of an additional five years for implementation would give municipalities the opportunity to better plan, resource and undertake this complex exercise. The 2030 timeline would help municipalities ensure that properties are not "thrown off the list" prematurely and without input from property owners.

ACO believes that property owners should not be forced to choose between designation and nothing at all to recognize the heritage significance of their property. However, this is the choice your government has forced on them. At the very least, owners and municipalities should be given more time to make this choice, and given reasonable notice of this extension.

WHEREAS not all persons who wish to attend can do so in person, that a hybrid participation option be considered for the sessions;



WHEREAS the following resolution was passed by Council of the City of Greater Sudbury on December 5, 2023: CC2023-303:

WHEREAS in 2015 the City of Greater Sudbury (the "City") entered into a contract with a contractor experienced in road construction projects to complete a project on Elgin Street in the City's downtown core;

AND WHEREAS the contract provided that the contractor would be the constructor for the project as that term is defined in the Occupational Health and Safety Act (the "Act");

AND WHEREAS an employee of the constructor operating a grader on the project struck and killed a pedestrian;

AND WHEREAS the City was charged with offences under the Act as the constructor and the employer;

AND WHEREAS after being acquitted at trial and on appeal, the Ontario Court of Appeal, in a decision issued on April 23, 2021, found the City to be liable for contraventions of the Construction Regulations as an employer as it employed quality control inspectors to monitor the quality of work on the project from time-to-time;

AND WHEREAS the Supreme Court of Canada, in a decision issued on November 10, 2023, was evenly divided 4-4 on the issue resulting in dismissal of the City's appeal;

AND WHEREAS the consequence of this decision is that municipalities in Ontario, as well as all other owners of property in the province, who wish to undertake construction, are subject to being charged and convicted as an employer for offences in relation to project sites for which they have no control and have, in accordance with the Act, contracted with an entity to assume plenary oversight and authority over the work on such site as the constructor;

AND WHEREAS the potential of an owner being charged as an employer as that term is defined in the Act in circumstances where it has engaged a constructor disregards and renders meaningless the owner-constructor provisions contained in the Act and presents an unacceptable level of increased risk and confusion for owners and contractors throughout the province;

AND WHEREAS the City believes that the safety of workers is paramount however the safety of workers on construction projects in Ontario is not increased by placing liability on parties that do not have control of and are not responsible for the conduct of the work on such sites;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Council for the City of Greater Sudbury requests that the province amend the Occupational Health and Safety Act to clarify the definition of "employer" to exclude owners that have contracted with a constructor for a project;



WHEREAS poverty is taking a devastating toll on communities, undermining a healthy and prosperous Ontario, with people in receipt of Ontario Works and Ontario Disability Support Program being disproportionately impacted;

WHEREAS the cost of food, housing, medicine, and other essential items have outpaced the highest inflation rates seen in a generation;

WHEREAS people in need of social assistance have been legislated into poverty, housing insecurity, hunger, poorer health, their motives questioned, and their dignity undermined;

WHEREAS Ontario Works (OW) Financial Assistance rates have been frozen since 2018 (\$733 per month);

WHEREAS Ontario Disability Support Program (ODSP) benefit rates have been increased by 6.5 per cent as of July 2023 to keep up with inflation, however even with the increase, ODSP rates still fall below their value in 2018 (\$1,376 when adjusted for inflation) and significantly below the disability-adjusted poverty line (\$3,091 per month)

WHEREAS OW and ODSP rates do not provide sufficient income for a basic standard of living and, as a result, hundreds of thousands of people across Ontario who rely on these programs live in poverty;

WHEREAS the poverty risk profile for Prince Edward County created by Vital Signs states that 10.1% - 13.5% of County residents are living on low income;

WHEREAS designated Service Managers are doing their part, but do not have the resources, capacity, or tools to provide the necessary income and health related supports to people experiencing poverty; and

WHEREAS leadership and urgent action is needed from the Provincial Government to immediately develop, resource, and implement a comprehensive plan to address the rising levels of poverty in Ontario, in particular for those on Ontario Works and Ontario Disability Support Programs;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Council of Prince Edward County joins the Town of Orangeville to calls on the Provincial Government to urgently:

- a) At least double Ontario Works and ODSP rates and index rates to inflation, answering calls already made by “Raise the Rates” campaign and the “Income Security Advocacy Centre”;
- b) Commit to ongoing cost of living increases above and beyond the rate of inflation to make up for the years they were frozen;
- c) Commit to jointly working between the Ministry of Children, Community, and Social Services and the Ministry of Health on the best methods of assessing client needs and then matching those in need to the services they require;

AND FURTHER THAT a copy of this resolution be sent to the Minister of Children, Community, and Social Services, the Minister of Health, the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing, the Association of Municipalities of Ontario, the Ontario Municipal Social Services Association, Prince Edward Lennox and Addington Social Services, the Eastern Ontario Wardens Caucus, and all Ontario Municipalities.

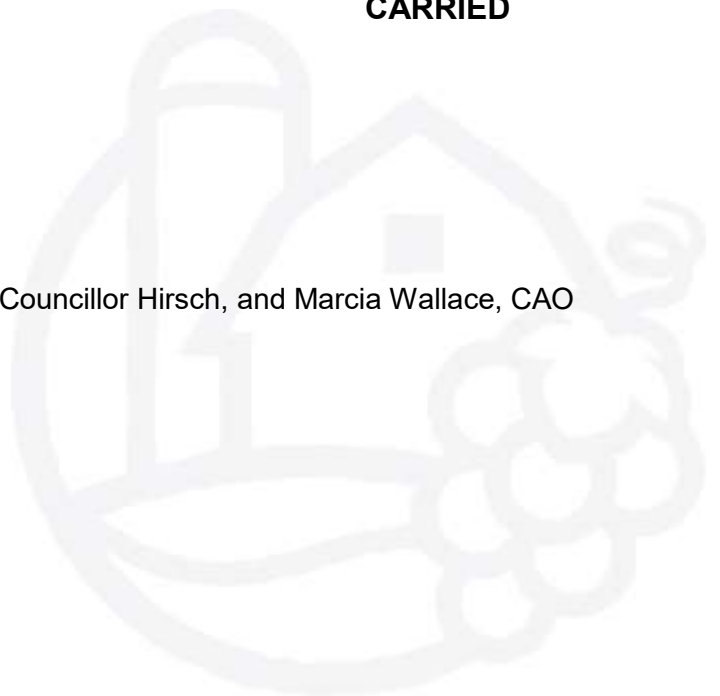

This report is to appoint an alternate Emergency Management Program Coordinator, otherwise referred to as an Alternate Community Emergency Management Coordinator (Alt-CEMC).

Report

The Ontario *Emergency Management and Civil Protection Act* establishes certain mandatory requirements for municipal Emergency Management programs. Among those is the requirement for municipal Council to appoint a Community Emergency Management Coordinator (CEMC) and an Alternate, as the individuals responsible for the coordination of all aspects of the municipality's Emergency Management program, and to ensure annual & ongoing compliance with provincial legislation and orders that may be issued.

Given the impending retirement of the incumbent Alt-CEMC, it is recommended that Council appoint Sébastien Mainville as the Nation Municipality alternate Community Emergency Management Coordinator, effective April 08, 2024. The timing of the appointment of this position will allow for a seamless transition in the coordination of the municipality emergency management program and current activities.

BY-LAW NO. 39-2024

BEING a by-law of the Corporation of The Nation Municipality to appoint an alternate Emergency Management Program Coordinator, otherwise referred to as an Alternate Community Emergency Management Coordinator (Alt-CEMC).

WHEREAS under the Emergency Management and Civil Protection Act, R.S.O. 1990, c. E. 9 as amended and Ontario Regulation 380/04 s.10 (1), states every municipality shall designate an employee of the municipality or a member of the council as its Emergency Management Program Coordinator.

WHEREAS under O. Reg 380/04 s.10 (2) The Emergency Management Program Coordinator shall complete the training that is required by the Chief, Emergency Management Ontario.

WHEREAS under O. Reg 380/04 s 10 (3) The Emergency Management Program Coordinator shall co-ordinate the development and implementation of the municipality's emergency management program within the municipality and shall co-ordinate the municipality's emergency management program in so far as possible with the emergency management programs of other municipalities, of ministries of the Ontario government and of organizations outside government that are involved in emergency management.

WHEREAS under O. Reg 380/04 s. 10 (4) The Emergency Management Program Coordinator shall report to the municipality's Emergency Management Program Committee on his or her work under subsection (3).

AND WHEREAS, the municipality finds it expedient that there be an Emergency Management Program Coordinator and an alternate Emergency Management Program Coordinator who shall assume the duties of the CEMC during his or her absence.

NOW THEREFORE, the Council of the Corporation of The Nation Municipality enacts as follows:

- 1) **THAT** Mr. Daniel R. Desforges shall remain as the Emergency Management Program Coordinator for The Nation Municipality.
- 2) **THAT** Mrs. Josée Brizard position as the alternate Emergency Management Program Coordinator for The Nation Municipality shall be terminated effective April 8th, 2024.
- 3) **THAT** Mr. Sébastien Mainville is hereby appointed as the alternate Emergency Management Program Coordinator for The Nation Municipality effective April 8th, 2024.
- 4) **THAT** the duties of these positions shall be as per the Emergency Management and Civil Protection Act, R.S.O. 1990, and regulations and in accordance with policies established by the Council of The Nation Municipality.
- 5) **THAT** By-law Number 79-2023 be hereby repealed.
- 6) **THAT** this By-law shall come into full force and take effect immediately upon the final passing thereof.



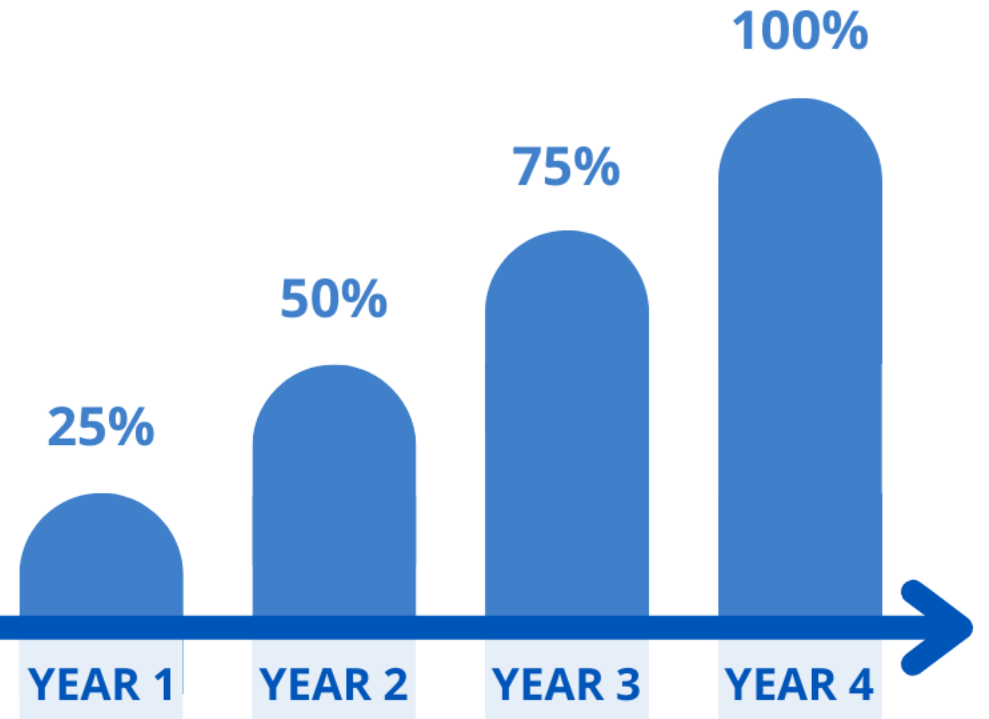

**EXEMPTION FROM PART LOT CONTROL BY-LAW
CORPORATION OF THE NATION MUNICIPALITY
BY-LAW NO. 36-2024**

"Being a By-law to exempt certain lands from Part Lot Control, in Registered Plan 50M316, on a Street legally named HORIZON STREET, in the Nation Municipality and in the County of Russell."

WHEREAS pursuant to the written request from BEEVAR HOMES INC., it is expedient to exempt from Part Lot Control certain lands being LOT 46 and LOT 47, Registered Plan 50M316;

WHEREAS the Planning Act, R.S.O. 1990, c.P.13, as amended, (the "Planning Act") subsection 50(5) provides that all lands within a plan of subdivision are subject to part lot control;

- b) THAT LOT 46, Registered Plan 50M316, being Parts 3 and 4 on Reference Plan 50R11476, in the Nation Municipality, County of Russell, designated for the purpose of this By-Law as Parcel "B", is hereby exempted from Part lot Control pursuant to subsection 50(5) of the Planning Act.
- c) THAT LOT 47, Registered Plan 50M316, being Parts 5 and 6 on Reference Plan 50R11476, in the Nation Municipality, County of Russell, designated for the purpose of this By-Law as Parcel "C", is hereby exempted from Part lot Control pursuant to subsection 50(5) of the Planning Act.
- d) THAT LOT 47, Registered Plan 50M316, being Parts 7 and 8 on Reference Plan 50R11476, in the Nation Municipality, County of Russell, designated for the purpose of this By-Law as Parcel "D", is hereby exempted from Part lot Control pursuant to subsection 50(5) of the Planning Act.
2. a) THAT LOT 46, Registered PLAN 50M 316, being part 2 on Reference Plan 50R11476, in the Nation Municipality, County of Russell, is hereby exempted from Part Lot Control pursuant to subsection 50(5) of the Planning Act.
- b) THAT LOT 46, Registered PLAN 50M 316, being part 4 on Reference Plan 50R11476, in the Nation Municipality, County of Russell, is hereby exempted from Part Lot Control pursuant to subsection 50(5) of the Planning Act.
- c) THAT LOT 47, Registered PLAN 50M 316, being part 6 on Reference Plan 50R11476, in the Nation Municipality, County of Russell, is hereby exempted from Part Lot Control pursuant to subsection 50(5) of the Planning Act.
- d) THAT LOT 47, Registered PLAN 50M 316, being part 8 on Reference Plan 50R11476, in the Nation Municipality, County of Russell, is hereby exempted from Part Lot Control pursuant to subsection 50(5) of the Planning Act.
- e) THAT section 2 of this by-law shall be effective only to the extent necessary to permit the creation of reciprocal easements for the shared use and access to wells located on Parts 2 and 4 on Reference Plan 50R11476 servicing both Parcel "A" and Parcel "B", and on Parts 6 and 7 on Reference Plan 50R11476 servicing both Parcel "C" and Parcel "D"
3. THAT this By-Law shall come into force upon approval and shall expire on April 8th, 2025, unless the Council of the Corporation of the Nation Municipality has provided an extension by amendment to this by-law prior to its expiry.

4. THAT this By-Law shall repeal and replace By-Law No. 104-2023.
5. THAT this By-law comes into force and effect when it is approved by the United Counties of Prescott and Russell.
6. THAT this by-law shall not be construed as to permit the further resubdivision or severance of any such parcel.
7. Registration of this by-law in the proper land registry office is authorized and this by-law shall thereupon become effective.
